Join shipwreck researcher Ric Mixter as he investigates the mystery and power of the Great Lakes in "Great Storms," a lecture presented as part of the exciting exhibition "WaterWorks: Soak Up the Science!" at Alden B. Dow Museum of Science and Art on Thursday, February 18 at 7 pm.

The author/historian will focus primarily on November gales, like the one that sank four freighters and barges on Lake Superior in 1905. He is also an expert on the 1913 storm, sharing insights and underwater video from several of the giant ships lost in the "King of Storms" that sank 19 ships. The lecture takes place in the Garden Room of Midland Center for the Arts, 1801 W. St. Andrews Rd., Midland. Tickets are \$8 general admission; \$5 for members. Holder of several certifications in SCUBA, including advanced ratings and ice rescue, he served several years on the Saginaw County Underwater Rescue Team as a marine deputy/diver and was also diver/videographer for expeditions to the *Edmund Fitzgerald* and *Carl D.
